Steele Saddle Tree is one of a handful of saddle tree makers in the US and they ship around the world. They have been in business since the 1870's in this area, owned by the same family.



They start out with blocks of wood.



And use custom-made 'following lathes' to shape the blocks into the pieces of the saddle trees.





Pieces are then glued together:







Once assembled they are sent to be covered in fiberglass:



Then they are cured:



The dark ones are double glassed for use in Australia.

Then they are stacked and await shipment – some of these have plastic parts – only about 10% are ordered that way.



We then retired for lunch on the Cumberland.



And saw another mode of transportation:
